2021 CJA Solicitation Submission Update

- Children's Justice Act application and 3-year assessment were submitted on Friday, May 28, 2021.
- Received notification from Lauren Fischman acknowledging receipt of the submission and that she would be in contact once the review of the submission was complete.



CJA Annual Submission Review Process

- ▶ Children's Bureau staff currently reviewing submissions
- States will receive an email by in July stating either:
 - The application has been reviewed and will be forwarded for approval by leadership or;
 - The application has been reviewed, but additional information is required before it can move forward for approval.
- Award letters will be sent out by September 30, 2021

CJA Quarterly Call

- CJA Leadership Team facilitated small group discussions focused on CJA-funded programs and activities
- Peer-to-peer discussions built on conversations that took place during the Annual Grantees Meeting in May
- Staff from the Capacity Building Center for States reviewed the CJA 2020 Report and State Examples, which identified and described specific programs



CJA 2020 Report

- A review was conducted of all 2020 Children's Justice Act (CJA) applications or 3-year plans submitted to describe and document how CJA funds were used by states between May 2019 to May 2020
- Included the CJA applications submitted in May 2020 by each of the 50 states, Puerto Rico, and the District of Columbia.
- Examined the 11 categories of possible activities and programs that could be funded through CJA and an additional section for examples that did not fit a specific category.



Children's Justice Act (CJA) Activities by Category - State Examples

- Experimental, Model, or Demonstration Programs
- Linkages to Human Trafficking
- Evaluations That Measure Outcomes
- Strategic Alignment With CJA Task Force Goals and Activities
 With CFSR, PIP, and APSR Goals
- Activities to Enhance and Improve Access to High-Quality Legal Representation for Children and Families
- Work to Enhance State and Local Agencies' Policies or Protocols Around Intake, Investigation, or Assessment

- Development, Expansion, or Enhancements to CACs That Improve Access to Comprehensive Services for Children and Families
- Activities to Improve Front-End System Practices (Hotline/Intake/Screening)
- Strategies to Improve Trauma-Informed Handling of Cases by Professionals (Including Investigators, Assessors, Lawyers, and Judges)
- Impact of the Pandemic on Grant Activities
- Use of Virtual Technologies for Training and Other Grant Activities
- Additional Examples and Comments

The name of each candidate child and identified imminent risk criteria met

Provided to prevent foster care, which candidate child will benefit, and specified service

Service completion status or reasons for discontinuation

Identified need(s) of each candidate child and each caregiver

Start and end dates for each prevention service provided

Case goals for the caregivers to address imminent risk (reasons for agency's involvement and prevention services)

2020-2021 Updates

Overview

- The CARP is a part of the Conference of District Attorneys
- Responsibilities include:
 - Developing and delivering training for prosecutors, law enforcement, and other allied professionals on various topics related to child abuse
 - Providing technical assistance to prosecutors and other allied professionals across the state
 - Serving as contributor to statewide committees and task forces on legal issues and the challenges facing child abuse investigators and prosecutors
 - Manages and regularly contributes to the North Carolina Child Abuse listsery
 - Handling conflict child abuse prosecutions as requested

Purpose

- Provide technical support and training for prosecutors and others on the topic of child abuse investigation and prosecution
- Identify emerging issues in child abuse law and provide materials to assist prosecutors and others in handling them
- Serve as a resource for those wanting more information on issues in child abuse prosecution
- Serve as a liaison between various professions and agencies who work with abused children to ensure all parties are supported, understood, and communicating

Recent Issues Addressed

- Changes to child abuse reporting laws
- Admitting the forensic interview into evidence without the child's testimony
- Handling a noncooperative non-offending parent
- Procedures to address out of state sex offenders and their inclusion on the sex offender registry
- Determining the correct abuse charge based on a child's injury

Current Publications

- The Child Physical Abuse Manual, distributed to every DAs office in the state, has been reviewed and updated and will be published this year
- A one-page primer on Child Physical Abuse has been distributed to every DAs Office in the state
- Quarterly article on child abuse in The State, the CODA newsletter
 - Past articles included COVID-related CA issues and dealing with non-cooperative parents

Trainings

- Over the course of 2020, the CARP delivered multiple trainings and webinars to groups including therapists, DSS, and medical professionals in addition to prosecutors and law enforcement
- In April of 2021, CODA hosted a two-day training by two national experts on working with child victims with disabilities
- In May, the CARP delivered a webinar to over 40 prosecutors on recent legal updates in child abuse law
- In June, the CARP delivered a webinar to over 40 prosecutors covering trial preparation challenges in child abuse cases

Upcoming Projects

- Working to compile a list of possible experts for prosecutors to contact with certain issues
 - Trauma's impact on the brain
 - Child psychology
 - Medical issues with abuse victims
- Planning one day "practical skills" course for prosecutors to train on child abuse specific trial skills
- Working to draft a template of common questions for witnesses in CA cases
- Planning various webinars for nurses, law enforcement, CAC staff, and prosecutors
