Executive Summary

Throughout 2009-2012, the North Carolina Governor's Crime Commission (GCC) continued its emphasis on strengthening the state's communities as well as the efficacy of the North Carolina criminal justice system. The last few years have been a time of trial and opportunity as our institutions and communities adjust to changes in the fiscal arena. These challenges are a reminder that the Governor's Crime Commission must be efficient in our work; the programs that benefit from funding through the Governor's Crime Commission have the potential to vastly improve North Carolina's communities. The Commission and staff have sought to increase effectiveness by building collaborations with institutional and community professionals. Opportunity lies in the fact that evidence-based programs, implemented by local, experienced practitioners, can guide North Carolina toward an even stronger future. Some of the work of the Governor's Crime Commission over the last four years, which has been guided by Governor Perdue and Secretary Young, includes the following.

- *Identifying pressing issues* – GCC's Criminal Justice Analysis Center (CJAC) has been at the forefront in conducting empirical research over the years. Their research and publications document the increasing number of gangs in the state. In part as a result of this data, the governor created the Governor's Gang Task Force in October 2010. The Task Force was formed to bring together persons who had their pulse on the issues of gangs to discuss the state of gangs and strategies to enhance anti-gang law enforcement efforts, and develop gang prevention policies in North Carolina.
- *Improving technology to enhance communication and data usage* – the Commission boosted emergency response capability of all public safety agencies with significant infrastructure enhancements to the Voice Interoperability Plan for Emergency Responders (VIPER) system. VIPER now allows for all public safety agencies to communicate with each other across the state. Also, the Commission provided continued funding for the Statewide Automated Victim's Assistance and Notification system (SAVAN), which serves as the official victim notification system for victims of crime in this state. Finally, the Local Crime Integration Project greatly improves data processing statewide by integrating and transmitting local arrest, incident, and citation information as well as state and national jail data to the Division of Criminal Information. The Department of Justice then transmits the local data into the national N-DEX program which allows multiple states' data to be shared.
- *Increasing successful prosecutions of dangerous offenders* – GCC has continued support for the Special Prosecutor program. The Special Prosecutors Program has had a great deal of success in North Carolina over the last four years. The intention of this program is to establish dually sworn Special Prosecutors in prosecutorial districts to prosecute felony cases involving violent offenses, firearms violations and drug offenses. All Special Prosecutors are dually sworn as Assistant District Attorneys (ADA) at the state level and Special Assistant United States Attorneys (SAUSA) at the federal level. This joint collaboration between local district attorneys and the United States Attorney's Office allow for drug traffickers to be prosecuted in federal court and

serve strict federal sentences for their crimes. Across the state, there have been hundreds of convictions in federal court for some of the worst gun and drug violators in the state of North Carolina.

- *Building on juvenile strengths* – Juvenile programming has focused on providing services to at-risk youth to deter them from the juvenile court system and the adult court system. Programs funded included teen court, youth gang diversion programs, vocational training, college preparation, Multi-Jurisdictional Juvenile Justice Treatment Continuum, and re-entry programs.
- *Reducing disproportionality of minority youth in correctional facilities* – GCC has spearheaded efforts to reduce the number of minority youth who are disproportionately detained or confined in secure detention, correctional facilities, and jails or lockups in relation to their presentation in the general population of the state. A statewide committee has been formed to make recommendations and several trainings on Disproportionate Minority Contact (DMC) were conducted with school administrators, law enforcement, parents, youth, and the courts to bring awareness to this issue.
- *Ensuring forensic compliance* – GCC has worked to meet the state’s need for the timely collection of forensic evidence and to ensure that Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) funding remained with the state of North Carolina. Collaborating with stakeholders, GCC has supported victims of sexual assault, ensuring they receive treatment and provide evidence for future prosecution, with an option to report the crime at the time of the examination. North Carolina has also worked to improve the collection, transfer, storage and retrieval of DNA evidence in these sexual assault cases.
- *Automating the granting process* – in 2010, a new Grants Enterprise Management System (GEMS) was developed for GCC and subrecipients. The mission of GEMS was to develop a user-friendly, centralized, electronic portal that would simplify the grants management processes, maximize the efficiency of grant operations, reduce the administrative burden placed on GCC staff and grant recipients, integrate the multiple functions of planning and grants management, and enhance efforts to achieve results-based outcomes.
- *Creating safe communities through education* – GCC’s training section continues to reduce the opportunity for crime in our neighborhoods via crime prevention and best practices training across the state. Between the years of 2009 and 2012, the training unit has provided training to more than 200 law enforcement agencies, 30 municipalities, 240 houses of worship, 150 schools, colleges, and universities, and thousands of individual citizens.

As the chief advisory body to the governor, the secretary, and criminal justice professionals throughout the state, the Governor’s Crime Commission must maintain a focus on programs that strengthen relationships and collaborations in our communities. The Commission must continue to build foundations for efficient, effective programming that enhances community safety and wellbeing by building infrastructure. The institutions of North Carolina can strengthen the quality of services provided and resources available by collaborating with state and local private and public partners. These

partnerships can assist with the challenges of some of the most intractable problems such as gangs, juvenile delinquency, and recidivism. Additionally, collaboration between law enforcement, community outreach groups, and the public itself will be required to confront the increasing problems of prescription drug abuse and human trafficking in the state.

The Commission is uniquely positioned to assist the work of adjusting to permanent new realities. The composition of the Commission is such that representation from across all disciplines and all parts of the state are brought together to discuss criminal justice issues and resolutions. The continued work of the Commission to build the infrastructure of efficient, effective processes and private-public mutually designed solutions to community needs is imperative and will go a long way in continuing to address issues that affect public safety and the needs of crime victims and the youth of this great state.

Introduction

The North Carolina Governor's Crime Commission (GCC) is proud to present this report of achievements during the years 2009-2012. The Governor's Crime Commission, located within the Department of Public Safety, serves as the chief advisory board to the governor and the secretary of Public Safety on crime and justice issues. Members of the Governor's Crime Commission and staff have worked consistently over the years to fulfill its mission of improving the quality of life for the citizens of North Carolina, enhancing public safety, and reducing and preventing crime by improving the criminal justice system. The Governor's Crime Commission serves as the State Administering Agency (SAA) for the management of federal block grant and discretionary grant funds.

The Governor's Crime Commission continues to meet quarterly to discuss and learn of issues that impact the citizens of North Carolina. These issues are taken into consideration as the commission devises its annual criminal justice plans. When developing criminal justice plans for the state, the commission considers identified needs across the state and within the criminal justice system. Legislative and policy initiatives are recommended and grant funding is awarded to selected applicants to address identified needs.

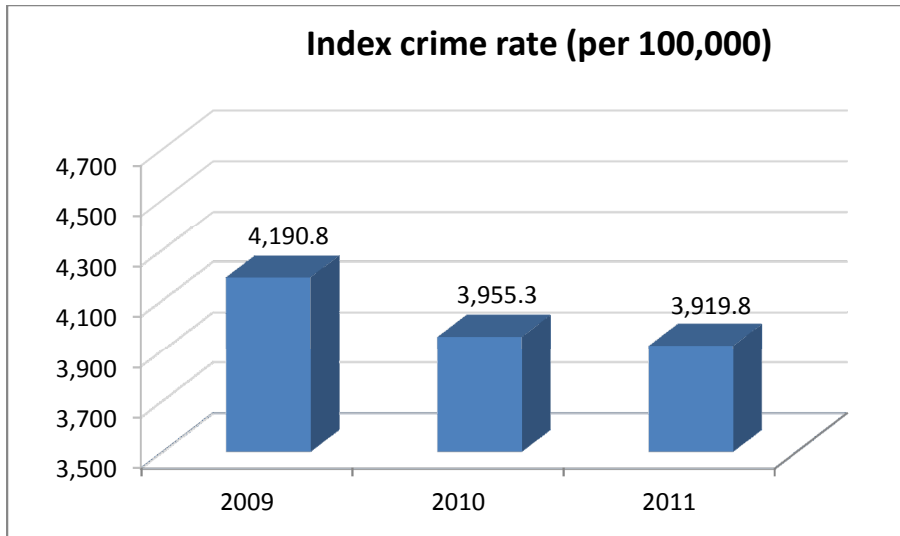
Members of the Governor's Crime Commission are divided into three working committees: the Criminal Justice Improvement Committee, the Juvenile Justice Planning Committee, and the Crime Victims' Services Committee. In this report you will find a summary of the crime trends in North Carolina during the last four years, initiatives that were funded by the Governor's Crime Commission to enhance the criminal justice system and prevent crime, a summary of enhancements to the processes of the Governor's Crime Commission, as well as a discussion of future issues that should be addressed.

North Carolina Crime Trends

Crime on the decline: Crime trends in North Carolina between 2009 and 2011

Historically, crime generally increases during tough economic times. However, surprisingly between 2009 and 2011,¹ North Carolina's index crime rate declined by almost 6.5 percent.

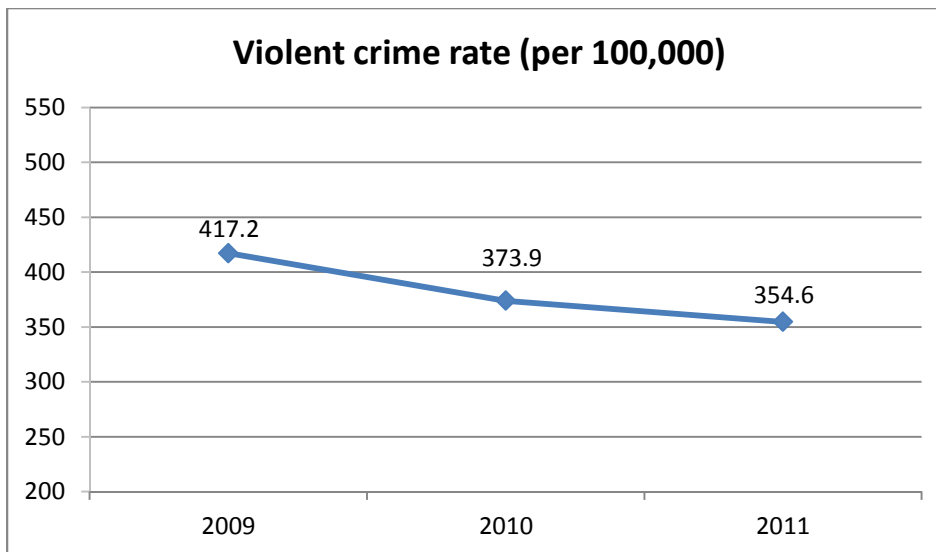

Notably during that period, the violent crime rate fell by 15 percent and:

- The murder rate remained stable and decreased by a mere 1.8 percent
- Reported rapes declined by 17.1 percent
- Reported robberies fell by a remarkable 22.7 percent
- Reported aggravated assaults decreased by 11.2 percent

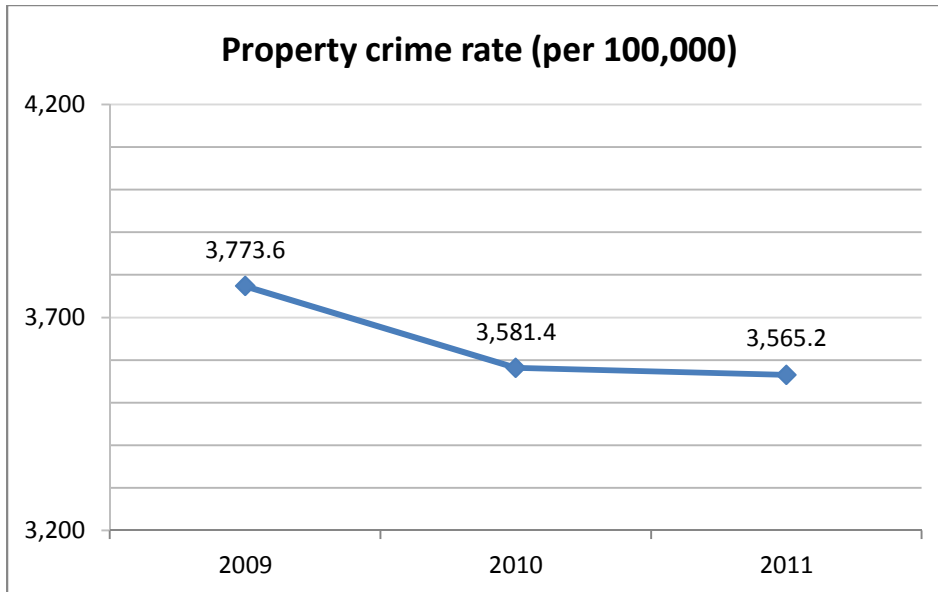

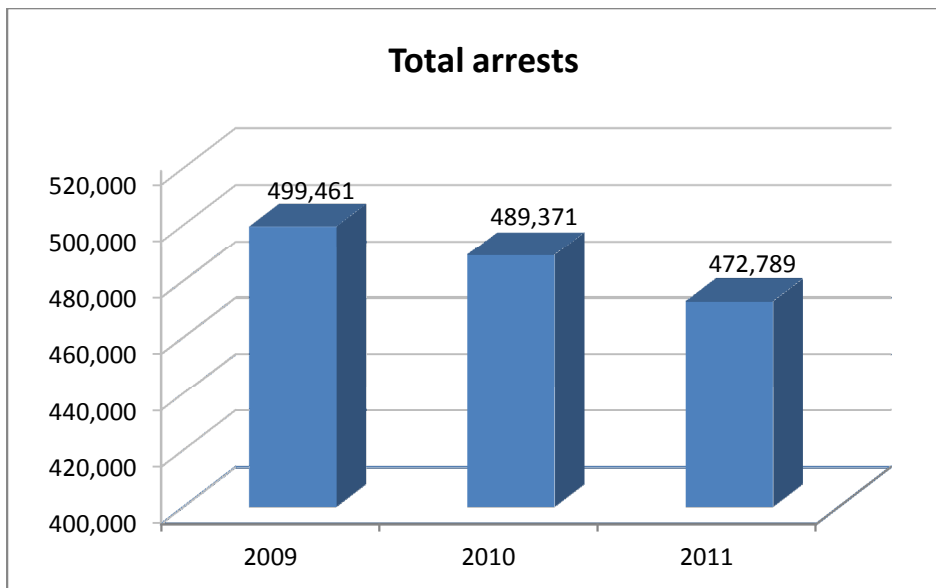
From 2009 to 2011, property crime declined by 5.5 percent. Specifically:

- The rate of reported burglaries fell by 6.1 percent
- Reported larcenies declined slightly by 4 percent
- Reported motor vehicle thefts decreased by 19.4 percent



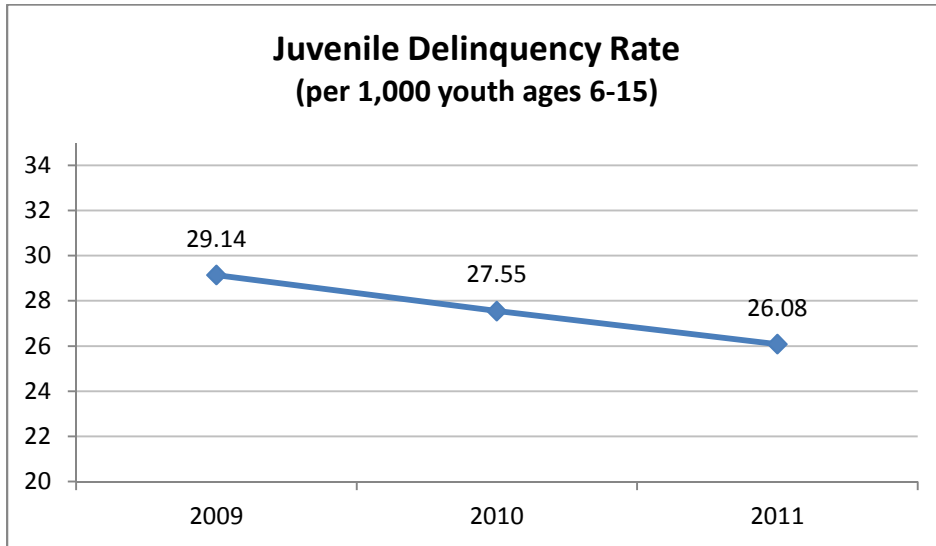

When taking into account other types of crime, such as drug possession, weapons charges, and fraud, the total number of overall arrests has declined every year over the most recent four years. Between 2009 and 2011, the total number of arrests statewide has fallen by 5.3 percent.

Likewise, juvenile delinquency has also been on the decline during recent years. The delinquency rate has decreased by 10.5 percent since 2009. Remarkably, the 2011 rate has been the lowest seen during the 21st century.

Governor's Crime Commission Program Initiatives and Emphases

Members of the Governor's Crime Commission are divided into three committees, each with their own mission and funding initiatives. These committees are the Criminal Justice Improvement Committee, the Juvenile Justice Planning Committee, and the Crime Victims' Services Committee. Staff of the Governor's Crime Commission are assigned to each committee and are responsible for managing federal block grant and discretionary funds to support initiatives funded through all committees. This section will provide information on each committee and provide examples of grants funded through each committee during the years 2009- 2012.

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) of 2009

One of the major sources of funding in 2009 was the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act award. The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) was signed into law on February 17, 2009. The primary policy goals of the Recovery Act were:

- To preserve and create jobs and promote economic recovery.
- To assist those most impacted by the recession.
- To provide investments needed to increase economic efficiency by spurring technological advances in science and health.
- To invest in transportation, environmental protection and other infrastructure that will provide long-term economic benefits.
- To stabilize state and local government budgets in order to minimize and avoid reductions in essential services and counterproductive state and local tax increases.

Due to the passage of the Recovery Act in 2009, the Governor's Crime Commission received approximately \$38 million in total funding to distribute to state agencies, local governments and non-profit agencies. Recovery Act funding has allowed the Governor's Crime Commission to vastly expand efforts to enhance public safety and provide critical services to victims of domestic violence and sexual assault.

Over 1,500 jobs were created in North Carolina to enhance statewide public safety and address the needs of crime victims to include:

- Sworn Law Enforcement Officers
- Juvenile Court Counselors
- Judicial Services Coordinators
- Victim/Witness Legal Assistants
- Bilingual Advocates
- Gang Prevention Coordinators
- Mental Health Therapists for Children Advocacy Centers
- District Attorneys and Clerks of Courts
- Information Technology experts for law enforcement infrastructure enhancements

Criminal Justice Improvement (CJI) Initiatives

The mission of the Criminal Justice Improvement Committee (CJI) is to encourage proactive and innovative programming and methodologies that improve the criminal justice system. Desired improvements include reducing and discouraging violent crime and associated problems, enhancing all

aspects of criminal justice processing to include the incarceration and treatment of offenders and advancing justice system operations.

Edward Byrne-Justice Assistance Grant Fund (JAG)

The Edward Byrne-Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Fund is allocated to individual states by the Bureau of Justice Assistance for drug control and systems improvement

JAG funds may be used for state and local initiatives, technical assistance, strategic planning, research and evaluation (including forensics), data collection, training, personnel, equipment, forensic laboratories, supplies, contractual support, and criminal justice information systems that will improve or enhance such areas as:

- Law enforcement programs
- Prosecution and court programs
- Prevention and education programs
- Corrections and community corrections programs
- Drug treatment and enforcement programs
- Planning, evaluation, and technology improvement programs
- Crime victim and witness programs (other than compensation)

JAG funds may also be used to address key statutory requirements that may not be otherwise funded, including requirements from the state and federal level, such as addressing limited English proficiency requirements and other similar mandates.

During the years 2009–2012, the state of North Carolina received approximately \$30,326,782 in its regular JAG allocation. In addition, the state received \$34,491,558 in JAG Recovery Funds in 2009. Below are a few program highlights from 2009–2012.

Law Enforcement

The state of North Carolina used JAG funds for various law enforcement strategies during 2009–2012. One of the most significant areas of need is equipment for local law enforcement agencies. The Local Law Enforcement Block Grant program provides a means for local agencies to meet equipment needs. The Governor’s Crime Commission is committed in ensuring that small, local law enforcement agencies have the basic tools for their existence. This has proven to be the lifeblood of many small agencies whose budgets were reduced during the economic recession. Many of these agencies purchased necessary equipment for their departments and have been able to use these funds to provide overtime reimbursement for their street patrols. Many of these agencies would not be able to have these items without funding from the Governor’s Crime Commission.

Technology Improvement

Over the last four years, JAG funds have been used to help many of the state’s infrastructure projects as well as many local technology improvement projects.

- JAG funds have been used to continue the support of the statewide 800 MHz Voice Interoperability Plan for Emergency Responders, (VIPER) with both support to the network in the way of infrastructure and towers to the local end users in the way of 800 MHz radios.
- JAG funds have been used to continue support of the Statewide Automated Victim’s Assistance and Notification (SAVAN) system which not only serves as the official victim notification system for victims of crime in this state but also supports law enforcement in their need for offender custody information.
- JAG funds were also invested in a statewide crime data integration project, which is an endeavor to integrate and transmit local arrest, and incident information as well as state and national jail data to the North Carolina Department of Justice. The Department of Justice then transmits the local data into the national N-DEx program which allows multiple states’ data to be shared. In addition, the data is passed to the North Carolina Crime Analysis Management System (CAMS) to be used for crime reporting and the state and national level as required by law.

These large projects have all had a significant impact on the state’s ability to communicate and share vital lifesaving information for all public safety agencies across North Carolina. The VIPER radio system has dramatically improved the lives of many public safety providers across the state as it has ensured a continuous line of communication no matter where law enforcement officers travel in their duties.

Courts and Correction

The Governor’s Crime Commission has a strong working relationship with the Division of Prisons, the defense bar, the district attorneys across the state, and the Administrative Office of the Courts. This collaboration has resulted in some very successful corrections, courts, and prosecution programs. One of the most impactful programs that has garnered great success is the Special Prosecutors Program. This joint venture between the United States Attorney’s Offices and the local district attorneys allows for the establishment of dually sworn Special Prosecutors in 12 prosecutorial districts to prosecute felony cases involving violent offenses, firearms violations, and drug offenses. All Special Prosecutors must be sworn as an assistant district attorney (ADA) at the state level and a Special Assistant United States Attorney (SAUSA) at the federal level. This program has been located in various prosecutorial districts throughout the state and covers a large part of the state geographically. It has resulted in the conviction and prosecution of hundreds of the worst violent crime offenders in the state of North Carolina.

The Governor’s Crime Commission has partnered with state and non-profit agencies to address critical needs and fill gaps in services in the justice system to include:

- Supplementing the Juvenile Court Counselor staff to alleviate a large backlog in the Juvenile Court system.
- Funding to the former Department of Correction for an additional 13 Judicial Service Coordinators to perform court intake services.
- Innovative programming with the Division of Adult Correction to address drug prescription drug dispensing needs. The Robotic Prescription Dispensing System is a unique program allowing the

Division of Adult Correction to procure and implement an automated robotic prescription dispensing system to assist with processing the Central Pharmacy's current dispensing system volume of 4,800 medication orders daily.

- Funding some highly successful re-entry programs including Project Re-Entry from the Piedmont Triad Regional Council. This program uses a pre to post release transition model in eight prisons around five counties. The selected prisons target both male and female inmates to participate in this program. This project formed partnerships with Goodwill Industries, the Criminal Justice Partnership Programs, and various other industries to create resources for these inmates. The program was recognized by the National Criminal Justice Association as a national success.

Prevention and Education Programs

The Governor's Crime Commission has funded multiple statewide training programs over the last four years. These statewide trainings have provided critical information for gang investigators, drug investigators, and other law enforcement officers, juvenile justice providers, clerks of court, sheriffs, district attorneys, and members of the general public. Many of these trainings were sponsored by the Governor's Crime Commission, such as the Gang Investigators Association, the Sheriffs' Leadership Institute, and the numerous crime prevention trainings that are taught by GCC staff.

One of the education initiatives that GCC put an emphasis on during this time is the prescription drug initiative. During the 2011 grant cycle, GCC solicited proposals to establish programs that will provide education, prevention, intervention and enforcement to intercept and disrupt the illegal use, possession, and sale of prescription drugs. The focus of these programs was to assist communities and law enforcement agencies with the following issues:

- Prescription drug diversion
- Prevention education
- Disruption of open air drug markets that supply prescription based controlled substances
- Investigations focused on doctor shopping, prescription forgery, and straw purchases of prescription drugs

GCC funded 10 prescription drug initiatives to address prescription drug abuse in the 2011 grant cycle. Five grants were awarded to sheriff's offices and five grants were awarded to local police departments. Prescription drug diversion will continue to be a priority for funding in 2012.

Juvenile Justice (JJ) Initiatives

The mission of the Juvenile Justice Planning Committee is to provide resources for youth who are at risk of becoming delinquent due to individual, school, family, peer, or community factors. These resources also provide services for youth who are delinquent, undisciplined, or involved in the juvenile court process from intake through aftercare.

In keeping with the mission of the committee, federal funding allocations support programs which meet the growing needs of the young people in the state. Priorities of the JJ Planning Committee include vocational services for court-involved youth, compliance with the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (JJDP) Act, and accountability-based programming to reduce recidivism.

As a means to address the needs of North Carolina's youth, programming is supported that incorporate accountability-based practices for court personnel, prevention programs for at-risk youth conduct, risk and needs assessments, and restorative justice opportunities for juvenile offenders. Programming includes teen courts, vocational programs, and juvenile mediation projects. Specific projects and initiatives supported by the JJ Planning Committee include:

- **Communities in Schools**—support for the development of a Communities in Schools affiliate which serves high risk, court involved youth. This program mobilized to provide services in the areas of vocational training, increasing graduation rates and college preparation.
- **JWise**—a statewide court information tracking system used to record activity for abuse, neglect, and dependency cases. GCC provided resources so court clerks may be adequately trained in its use.
- **Vocational Programming**—programs provided specific instruction in the areas of pre-vocational, vocational, job readiness, and life skills to court involved youth. Partnerships with employers and area colleges and universities provided a pathway for program participants to transition from the court system back into the community. The Kids at Work! program in Haywood and Jackson Counties was funded in 2009 to provide culinary training to at-risk youth. As a holistic approach, Kids at Work! reaches beyond professional cooking instruction to include conflict resolution, job preparedness, job placement, and mentoring components. From 2009-2012, 15 other vocational programs were funded, reaching counties that span the state.
- **Teen Courts**—intensive judicial intervention, case management, court supervision, treatment, and related services to targeted delinquent youth to reduce substance use and related criminal behavior, while providing them with an opportunity to create positive change in their lives. The Mecklenburg County Teen Court leverages GCC funding, partnerships with law enforcement, and the assistance of youth and adult volunteers to work with first-time misdemeanants. Among other things, the program has experienced success in the form of a high completion rate and the large number of referrals coming from school resource officers. Other programs using the teen court model have been funded in Brunswick, Halifax, Harnett, Johnston, and Washington counties.
- **Multi-Jurisdictional Juvenile Justice Treatment Continuum**—provision of essential services to youth ages 11-17 who are involved with the juvenile justice system. Services include wrap-around case management, substance abuse, skill building, conflict resolution, and pre-trial services. This project also provided mentoring services for African American males, electronic monitoring, and residential and respite care for youth transitioning back into the community.

- Re-entry—a multi-jurisdictional program which increased the number of youth who successfully reentered their home communities, school, and the world of work after being released from a youth development center. Funding was awarded to the former Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention in 2009 and in 2011 to operate the JumpStart Program. JumpStart works with the youth development center student population to provide workforce readiness skills. Youthful offenders are given the tools to find and retain employment and to become responsible and productive contributors to society.

Statewide Disproportionate Minority Contact (DMC)

Statewide DMC Committee

The Statewide Disproportionate Minority Contact (DMC) committee is staffed by a full-time DMC Coordinator, who provides recommendations to the Juvenile Justice Committee/State Advisory Group (SAG) regarding efforts to reduce the number of minority youth who are disproportionately detained or confined in secure detention, correctional facilities, and jails or lockups in relation to their representation in the general population.

The committee makes recommendations to reduce disproportionality in other areas to include school suspension and child maltreatment. The committee is composed of representatives from local law enforcement, the Division of Juvenile Justice (DJJ), the Division of Adult Correction (DAC), the Department of Public Instruction (DPI), the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC), the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) and citizen appointments. The statewide DMC committee meets on a quarterly basis under the leadership of Chief Rodney Monroe of the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department.

Committee strategies to address DMC in North Carolina include the following:

- Supporting the development of a uniform data collection system in NCJOIN that will enable juvenile justice professionals to collect accurate data at each stage in the juvenile justice system to determine where disparities exist.
- Implementation of a coordinated plan involving all stakeholders in the juvenile justice system that will enable the development of “effective practices” to be disseminated throughout other areas of North Carolina following an evaluation.
- Regular evaluation and monitoring of local and statewide activities and their outcomes.
- Raising the awareness of the DMC issue through conference presentations, meetings and publications.

Trainings

The DMC statewide committee partnered with a local DMC reduction site (Race Matters for Juvenile Justice/Mecklenburg County) and participated in a two day Cultural Diversity/Dismantling Racism

training. The training provided the opportunity for both groups to have open dialogue about racism as it relates to the institutions, youth, and families in North Carolina. The DMC committee plans to take the lessons learned from the training and build annual goals surrounding the issue of racism and DMC in the community. The committee plans to continue with additional trainings throughout the year as it pertains to continued DMC reduction efforts.

DMC Committee Projects

The DMC Committee formed two smaller working committees to work on specific DMC issues for the state of North Carolina. The two committees are the Juvenile Code Subcommittee and the Public Awareness Subcommittee. Each committee has specific goals and objectives that they are working towards as it relates to DMC reduction for the state.

The Juvenile Code Subcommittee worked on revisions to the juvenile code which would assist with the reduction of disparity at various contact points within the juvenile justice system.

The focus of the Public Awareness Subcommittee is local and statewide awareness as well as targeted audiences including school administrators, law enforcement, parents, youth, and the courts. Some of the public awareness highlights included:

- North Carolina was highlighted on the National Training and Technical Assistance Center (NTTAC) website for exceptional DMC initiatives taking place in North Carolina.
- The North Carolina DMC coordinator had the opportunity to present North Carolina DMC data and information in a national webinar hosted by the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP).
- The North Carolina DMC coordinator presented a DMC session at the Education Summit Conference sponsored by the Howard Lee Foundation.
- The North Carolina DMC coordinator presented with the Division of Juvenile Justice staff on the topic of DMC at the annual Communities in School conference.

Local DMC projects

Union County was one of the state's original demonstration sites for DMC reduction efforts. This county served as a mentor to other counties on DMC reduction efforts at the local level. Union County hosted a one day community conference in April 2011 to discuss their successes with their DMC reduction activities. This county continues to work on local DMC system changes with the goal of the changes being implemented statewide.

Union County implemented the following activities to be replicated statewide:

- Graduated sanctions: the sanctions grid lists a variety of sanction options that may be applied when a youth violates a court order.

- Detention screening tool: this screening tool will aid in the utilization of community based programs located in target geographical locations to serve youth of color as alternatives to incarceration.

Pitt County implemented their Project Equal program, which was designed to offer the parent and student other alternatives to suspension, in the local middle and high schools in the county. The Greenville Police Department and Pitt County schools collaborated to implement this initiative to help reduce the number of students on out of school suspension and ultimately the number entering the justice system. As a result, the following initiatives were achieved:

- Training School Resource Officers: two SROs have received basic national training and four SROs have received advanced national training.
- Implementing the Positive Behavior Intervention Support Initiative (PBIS): 15 schools (10 middle schools and five high schools) implemented or are trained to implement PBIS. Based on the 2009-2010 enrollment numbers, this component alone would impact more than 11,000 students.
- Learning from the Teaching with Poverty in Mind component: The superintendent of the Pitt County School system, Dr. Beverly Reep, has shown commitment to this project by personally leading the effort to create a professional learning community (PLC) team around the subject of the effect of poverty on children and ways of implementing strategies in the school environment. All 50 school principals and central office administrators participated.
- Implementing the Out of School Suspension (OSS) Reduction Program: This voluntary program was operational in all 19 schools. As of June 30, 2011, a total of:
 - 2,738 OSSs have been averted;
 - 4,641 school days maintained;
 - 27,846 hours of instruction maintained;
 - 1,762 students served by this component (students potentially not on the street);
 - And a 33.31% decrease in the number of African American related OSSs

Durham County DMC Initiative (North Carolina Central University)

This project used findings from the North Carolina DMC demonstration sites and emerging best practices to address DMC in Durham County. The aim of this project was to take a systems approach to assessing and (where appropriate) modifying practices, policies, and procedures deemed to be contributory factors to DMC. The following objectives were met with this project:

- The Juvenile Justice Institute at North Carolina Central University initiated School Suspension, Expulsion, and Dropout Roundtables where staff presented relevant information to diverse groups around the state. DMC was included in the presentation which allowed for visibility of the issue.

- The DMC Project Manager hosted and attended a training dealing with youth culture and how professionals who work with youth can better interface with them. Dr. Derek Greenfield, Professor of Sociology at Shaw University and North Carolina State University, conducted the training. From a system's perspective, bias is a key component that has to be addressed in efforts toward DMC reduction. The trainees participated in vigorous discussion and exercises to address personal biases.

Statewide Disproportionate Minority Contact (DMC) Assessment

Winston-Salem State University's Center for Community Safety conducted a statewide assessment of DMC across multiple decision points in urban, suburban, and the eastern, central, and piedmont regions of North Carolina. The purpose of the North Carolina Disproportionate Minority Contact (DMC) Assessment Study is to provide scientifically-based feedback to state and federal officials, law makers, and other key stakeholders. This study conducts a thoughtful analysis of eight juvenile justice decision points including (1) detention admissions, (2) dispositions, (3) Youth Development Center commitments, (4) transfers to Superior Court, as well as complaints (5) received (6) not approved (7) approved, and (8) adjudicated. It examines whether intentional or unintentional biases impact the outcomes for minority youth. The study examines several key research questions including does racial bias occur at the referral source or at other decision points? What are other contributing factors to DMC besides racial bias?

**The final report will be completed in December 2012 and will be used to develop implications for more cost-effective and evidence-based interventions with youth impacted by DMC.*

Compliance with the JJDP Act

North Carolina is out of compliance with one two core protections of the federal JJDP Act. As a result, the state does not have access to important juvenile justice funds; monies which would otherwise be available to communities, governmental organizations, and nonprofit groups responding to juvenile delinquency and related concerns. Revisions to the Juvenile Code will put North Carolina on the path to come back in regaining compliance with the federal Act.

Many of North Carolina's Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act compliance violations occur due to accused status offenders being held in a juvenile detention center for more than 24 hours. In complying with the federal JJDP Act, an accused status offender can be held for up to 24 hours prior to an initial court appearance and for an additional 24 hours, excluding weekends and legal holidays, in a secure juvenile detention facility. In certain circumstances, North Carolina's statutes allow juvenile status offenders to be detained for periods of time that exceed 24 hours. Violations may also result when status offenders are securely detained for being in contempt of court.

The state has recently enacted legislation to ensure that juveniles are not detained in ways that violate the core protections of the JJDP Act. Under the previous North Carolina General Statute 7B-1903(b)(7), courts had the capacity to order secure custody for a juvenile "alleged to be undisciplined by virtue of the juvenile's being a runaway" for a period of secure custody of "up to 24 hours, excluding Saturdays, Sundays, and State holidays, or where circumstances require, for a period not to exceed 72 hours to

evaluate the juvenile's need for medical or psychiatric treatment or to facilitate reunion with the juvenile's parents, guardian, or custodian [emphasis added].” This statute has been amended to allow for a maximum 24 holding of status offenders which has moved this state in a positive direction in regaining compliance and accessing valuable federal resources.

Another successful effort in regaining compliance with the federal JJDP Act has been the partnership between the Governor’s Crime Commission and the Division of Juvenile Justice. Regional forums were conducted statewide in which key juvenile justice officials and local community members were invited to discuss the pertinent details around compliance in our state. These forums allowed for an in-depth dialogue amongst judges, law enforcement, court personnel and community partners resulting in a clearer understanding of monitoring for compliance as well as developing more favorable outcomes for youth.

Responding to the Needs of Delinquent Youth with Substance Abuse Issues

Based on prior practices and analysis of data showing an increase in youth substance abuse, the state of North Carolina recognizes an ever increasing need for a new systems approach to substance use. Further, families, youth, and professionals are overwhelmed and frustrated with the current maze of systems. The manner in which systems address and treat delinquent youth with substance abuse issues is expensive, ineffective and unresponsive to needs of youth and families at key transition points.

North Carolina is currently a Reclaiming Futures site and has worked for the past year on building capacity to incorporate the Reclaiming Futures model in selected sites. The work of this initiative includes: 1) Adopting evidence-and empirically-based practices to substance abuse treatment and case planning around substance-abusing juvenile offenders; 2) Identifying and educating key policy makers in evidence-and empirically-based practices ; and 3) showing measurable improvements in a) system collaboration; b) completion of evidence-based treatment; and c) reductions in recidivism by substance abusing youth.

North Carolina’s initiative to address the needs of delinquent youth with substance abuse issues includes the following:

- Improving substance abuse treatment success of substance-using youth in the juvenile justice system
- Reducing recidivism by substance-using youth in the juvenile justice system
- Identifying a system change approach that will improve treatment of substance-abusing juvenile offenders
- Developing strong measurement and tracking components to ensure process and program goals are met

Crime Victim Services (CVS) Initiatives

The mission of the Crime Victims' Services Committee is to advocate for victims by promoting the development of effective programs that improve the response of human service professionals and the criminal justice system to crime victims.

Victims of Crime Act (VOCA)

Purpose

The primary purpose of the VOCA victim assistance grant program is to extend and enhance services to victims of crime. For the purposes of this program, services are defined as those efforts that 1) respond to the emotional and physical needs of crime victims; 2) assist primary and secondary victims of crime to stabilize their lives after a victimization; 3) assist victims in understanding and participating in the criminal justice system; and 4) provide victims of crime with a measure of safety and security such as boarding up broken windows and replacing or repairing locks. A crime victim is a person who has suffered physical, sexual, financial, or emotional harm as a result of the commission of a crime.

VOCA grants support the direct provision of services to victims of all types of crime, such as: emergency shelter, crisis intervention, counseling, accompaniment to hospitals for medical examinations, support groups, therapy, legal advocacy, personal advocacy, case management, and transportation.

Funding

Over the last four years (2008-2012), more than \$28 million dollars has been administered to fund approximately 250 projects.

Some of the programs funded through GCC include:

- Shelter services
- Rape crisis centers
- Victim advocacy
- Child advocacy
- Therapeutic services/specialized mental health services
- Supervised visitation
- Legal services

The VOCA program significantly impacts victims in North Carolina and continues to provide much needed support and resources for the agencies serving the needs of victims.

Violence Against Women Act (VAWA)

Purpose

The STOP (Services * Training * Officers * Prosecutors) Violence Against Women Formula Grant Program promotes a coordinated, multidisciplinary approach to improving the criminal justice system's response to violent crimes against women. The STOP Program encourages the development and strengthening of effective law enforcement and prosecution strategies to address violent crimes against women and the development and strengthening of victim services in cases involving violent crimes against women.

The emphasis of the STOP Program continues to be on the implementation of comprehensive strategies addressing violence against women that are sensitive to the needs and safety of victims and hold offenders accountable for their crimes. In order to respond more vigorously to domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking crimes, states should seek to carry out these strategies by: a) forging lasting partnerships between the criminal justice system and victim advocacy organizations; b) encouraging communities to look beyond traditional resources; and c) seeking out new partners such as faith-based and community organizations.

VAWA requires a Coordinated Community Response (CCR) to coordinate all parts of the criminal justice system (improve response) and to recognize that the criminal justice system needs to incorporate victim services in order to be more successful for victims and communities.

When accepting a VAWA award, North Carolina certifies that:

1) North Carolina meets compliance with regards to Forensic Medical Examinations (FMEs);

- a) Access to an FME at no cost to the victim*
- b) Victim chooses to report/not report a sexual assault to law enforcement and still receive an FME*

2) A victim cannot bear the cost of filing, issuance, registration or service of a petition for a protection order or costs associated with filing a criminal charge against an offender;

3) The state's laws, policies or practices will ensure that no law enforcement officer, prosecutor, or other government official shall ask or required an adult, youth or child victim of an alleged sex offense as defined under federal, tribal, state, territory, or local law to submit to a polygraph exam or other truth-telling device as a condition of proceeding with the investigation of such offense.

Funding

During the last four years (2008-2012), more than \$19.7 million dollars has been administered to fund approximately 180 projects.

Some of the programs funded through GCC include but are not limited to:

- Victim Witness Legal Assistants
- Victim Advocates in Law Enforcement
- Specialized Prosecution
- Specialized Courts
- Training initiatives
- VAWA Resource Prosecutor (statewide)
- Specialized Investigators
- Therapeutic Services
- Transitional Housing
- Shelter services

- Supervised Visitation
- Batterer’s Intervention Programs
- Rape Crisis Centers
- Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners
- Equipment to support these positions

Human Trafficking

The Governor’s Crime Commission has initiated and supported several efforts to combat human trafficking as part of a statewide, grassroots effort to rescue and restore victims and to disrupt and prosecute those who profit from the exploitation of women, children, and other vulnerable populations. The Governor’s Crime Commission initially supported the Pitt County Sheriff’s Office in their federal application to organize law enforcement through training and enhanced investigation efforts and the North Carolina Coalition against Sexual Assault (NCCASA) in their efforts to organize service providers, but, since that effort, these federally funded agencies have joined collaboratively with the North Carolina Coalition Against Human Trafficking (NCCAHT) to form one task force serving in various capacities. GCC has been there to meet their needs, as they arise, with this crime problem.

The Governor’s Crime Commission has not only served as a statewide network and resource to local communities, it has also served as a funding source by providing necessary grant resources through federal block programs to address human trafficking. GCC awarded a federal grant to the North Carolina Coalition Against Sexual Assault to strengthen the collaboration and cooperation between Cumberland County law enforcement and service providers to confront Domestic Minor Sex Trafficking (DMST). In addition, the Governor’s Crime Commission has funded the coordination of law enforcement and service providers through NCCAHT. NCCAHT is currently employing a case management approach, coordinated through a regional rapid response team strategy.

Other efforts have included support of local programs to apply directly for federal funding, training and services provided through grantees, such as the North Carolina Justice Academy and training made available through GCC itself. In addition, the Criminal Justice Analysis Center has conducted surveys, gathered information, and provided information on trafficking with publications such as the System Stats publication. The planning and analysis sections of the Governor’s Crime Commission are currently collaborating with Northeastern University and the Bureau of Justice Assistance to explore better ways to capture the incidence and prevalence of trafficking in North Carolina, as well as to capture the efforts of law enforcement and service providers across the state. This effort will help to inform the Governor’s Crime Commission and other bodies regarding policy implications and the allocation of resources.

Forensic Compliance – Ongoing Initiative

The forensic compliance project was initiated and supported by the Governor’s Crime Commission out of a need to meet the mandates of the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA). In 2005, the reauthorization of VAWA recognized the need for victims of sexual assault to receive treatment and provide evidence for future prosecution, with an option to report the crime at the time of the examination. This program helped to meet the state’s need for the timely collection of forensic evidence and to ensure that VAWA funding remained with the state of North Carolina. The Governor’s Crime Commission convened stakeholders to

establish a physical site to store the evidence as well as a process to ensure the transport and retrieval was secure. Above all, advocates, the medical community, and law enforcement were involved to ensure victims were and are provided the option to obtain a forensic medical exam without any cost to them and to report the crime in a safe manner.

Mental Health Collaboration

The Mental Health workgroup was formed to identify critical steps that build capacity within victim service programs and among allied professionals and to effectively link victims with mental health services.

A survey targeting mental health providers has been developed. Following that survey, there will be a victim service provider survey developed and distributed. This has the potential to address needs, as well as gaps in services as it relates to the mental health of victims.

Services to Crime Victims

Over the last four years, the CVS committee awarded more than \$48 million dollars to victim service agencies including:

- Domestic Violence/Sexual Assault Providers
- Transitional Housing
- Child Advocacy Centers
- Supervised Visitation Centers
- Specialized Law Enforcement and Prosecution Units
- Legal Services to Victims
- Mental Health Services to Victims

Some notable programs funded through the Crime Victims Service Committee of the Governor's Crime Commission include the following:

- Domestic Violence/Sexual Assault (DV/SA) Statewide Database Initiative - the project was administered by the North Carolina Coalition against Domestic Violence (NCCADV) in partnership with the North Carolina Coalition against Sexual Assault (NCCASA). Funding was used to create a database to be used by all recognized DV/SA service providers in North Carolina to track services provided. It will also create capacity for programs and funders to evaluate service impact statewide.
- Domestic Minor Sex Trafficking: this project provides outreach, identification, and service delivery for domestic minor sexual trafficked victims in Cumberland County. The project serves as a means to strengthen collaboration and cooperation between law enforcement and victim service providers in the community.
- The Southern Documentary Fund/Survivor to Survivor: this is a web-based campaign to reach and assist survivors of domestic violence. The initiative is unique to the state of North Carolina,

with a group of advocates and filmmakers collaborating to produce a series of short documentaries focused on topics such as defining abuse, aiding children of abusive homes, and devising a safe exit plan. The DVD is available at no charge to domestic violence programs across the state.

- Kiran: a multi-cultural, non-religious, community based South Asian organization that provides domestic violence services for South Asian women. It is the first program of its kind in the state.
- Victims of Violence - LMS (Learning Management System): this is a good example of capacity building for law enforcement. Law enforcement's ability to access training will forever be a challenge due to their 24-hr/7day a week presence. The North Carolina Justice Academy, through an award by the Governor's Crime Commission, met this challenge through the Learning Management System (LMS). LMS was developed to help law enforcement in their endeavor to maintain proficiency in the areas of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking. It is an online learning system that can be accessed through the community college system across the state, allowing law enforcement access to vital training in these violence against women purpose areas. It served to both meet their required in-service training requirement and to provide them the skills to negotiate the most dangerous situations involving interpersonal violence. This new educational medium alleviated the need for departments to re-allocate personnel, or deny some officers needed training, so that others could travel to receive justice academy training.

Grants Management

The grants management staff played an integral role in facilitating many of the accomplishments and initiatives of the Governor's Crime Commission during the past four years. The mission of the grants management section is to assure the efficient management of federal block grants consistent with state and federal policies and regulations and to serve as community development specialists for the citizens of North Carolina. The grants management section oversees all grants that are administered by the Governor's Crime Commission, assuring that money is used according to federal and state governmental regulations during the life of the grant.

The duties of the grants management staff include:

- Reviewing and making recommendations regarding grant pre-applications.
- Conducting comprehensive assessments to determine the fiscal and programmatic level of risk for grant applicants.
- Providing financial guidance for current grantees to ensure proper stewardship of grant funds.

- Providing programmatic technical assistance to ensure grantees are making reasonable progress towards meeting stated goals and objectives.
- Reviewing and approving expense reimbursements to determine if the grantees' expenditures are allowable, reasonable, necessary, accurate, and verifiable through appropriate supporting documentation.
- Reviewing and approving programmatic and budgetary grant adjustments.
- Reviewing contractual agreements to ensure the documents are consistent with the project goals/objectives and the budget.
- Conducting on-site visits and desk audits.
- Providing continuous monitoring through observation, interviews, data collection, data reviews and site visits.
- Conducting annual grant award workshops.
- Facilitating end-of-year grant close-outs.
- Serving as the GCC representative at interagency meetings.
- Conducting community education activities.

Although the mission and primary duties of the grants management section have remained constant, the scope and complexity of this section's duties have vastly increased during the past four years. This report reflects the scope and nature of those changes, including the development of an electronic grants management system, the management of Recovery Act grants and the development and implementation of a comprehensive pre-award and post-award monitoring plan.

Grants Enterprise Management System

The Grants Enterprise Management System (GEMS) is the electronic, web-based grants management system developed in 2010 to manage the entire grant lifecycle process. The GEMS project was initiated in 2009 with kick-off meetings to introduce the concept of an electronic grants management system and provide an overview of the project. The initiation of GEMS in 2010 was the culmination of a comprehensive planning endeavor by executive management, grants management, and planning staff of the Governor's Crime Commission. The mission was to develop a user-friendly, centralized, electronic portal that would simplify the grants management processes, maximize the efficiency of grant operations, reduce the administrative burden placed on GCC staff and grant recipients, integrate the multiple functions of planning and grants management, and enhance efforts to achieve results-based outcomes.

GEMS is designed to standardize and streamline the grant processes while enhancing the program effectiveness, efficiency, transparency, and compliance of all grant management operations. GEMS allows planners, grants management staff, administrators, grant applicants, grantees, and grant reviewers to effectively manage the entire grant cycle including the submission, scoring and awarding of grant proposals, the management and monitoring of grant projects and the submission, review and approval of performance reports, adjustment requests, and reimbursement requests. Additional benefits of GEMS include:

- Automating and simplifying the reimbursement and adjustment processes
- Standardizing the grant application process
- Reducing grant application errors and redundancy
- Enhancing monitoring efforts
- Maintaining automated schedules for tracking reports and compliance expiration dates
- Improving efforts to assure grant compliance with state and federal regulations
- Providing a clear, delineated workflow
- Reducing paperwork
- Leveraging technology to improve access to public information
- Enhancing efforts to collect and report projects results and aggregate data in a timely manner
- Improving public accountability
- Improving file management
- Enhancing the communication and coordination between grant stakeholders
- Enhancing public awareness regarding grant successes
- Allowing grantees to view their fund balances and grant transactions in real time

Grants Monitoring Plan

The Governor's Crime Commission has improved monitoring efforts and has established a more comprehensive grants monitoring program for all federal and state grants for which GCC is responsible.

The goal is to monitor grant applicants and grantees in a manner that promotes the highest standard of quality and efficiency in providing programming for North Carolinians, ensure fiscal accountability, and prevent waste, fraud, and abuse. GCC is committed to obtaining accurate data on grant performance throughout the life of the grant and ensuring the grantees' compliance with all federal and state regulations. This commitment is reflected in efforts to communicate clear expectations to grantees, provide timely guidance on compliance issues, and help grantees continually improve their operations. The specific objectives of the grants monitoring program include:

- Assessing the capacity of grant applicants to successfully manage grants.
- Providing continuous oversight and monitoring of federal and state grants.
- Developing a grants monitoring program that will meet all federal and state guidelines.
- Assuring that grantees are achieving their intended goals and objectives.
- Identifying and tracking grant results.
- Identifying the technical assistance needs of grantees.
- Ensuring timely expenditures of grant funds.

Pre-Award Monitoring

The initial monitoring begins with a risk assessment to determine the applicant's ability to execute the terms of the grant and to provide pertinent information for the effective monitoring of the grant should the applicant be selected for funding. The grants management staff uses a standard risk assessment questionnaire and checklist to assess the applicant's ability and potential to comply with all required regulations and successfully meet all programmatic goals and objectives. The Agency Risk Assessment is used when non-profits or non-governmental agencies have never received GCC funding or have not received a grant within the past three years. In addition, any continuously funded non-profit, non-governmental agency will be reassessed after any critical staff change of key agency personnel. The following factors are examined during the course of a risk assessment review:

- Non-profit status
- Experience managing federal/state grants
- Board composition, stability and effectiveness
- Financial stability and resources
- Accounting procedures

- Internal controls
- Program operation
- History of program activity
- Demonstrated track record of program success
- Past and current compliance issues
- Size and complexity of grant
- Organizational structure and by-laws
- Staff skills and experience
- Sustainability plan
- Policies and procedures
- Collaborative partnerships

Post-Award Monitoring

Once a grant is awarded, the grants management specialist monitors the project throughout the duration of the grant cycle. Monitoring techniques include observation of project activities, site visits, interviews with project staff, progress report reviews, desk audits, telephone and e-mail contact and online data reviews. The frequency of project monitoring is contingent on the size of the grant, associated risks, sensitivity of the grant, type of grant, and complexity of the grant. Each grants management specialist is expected to fully and accurately document all monitoring efforts. A grant file containing all monitoring activities is maintained for each grantee. All monitoring activities/forms are documented and placed in the grant file or electronically attached to the project in GEMS. Items to be placed in the grant or uploaded into GEMS include the following:

- Prospective Agency Risk Assessment Checklist (if required).
- Programmatic grantee reports.
- Grant File Checklist/Desk Review monitoring reports.
- On-site visit report.
- Corrective action plan.

- Copies of e-mails, memos or other written correspondence with the grantee, including any notification informing a grantee of the results of monitoring activities.

Subrecipient Highlights

Nationally Recognized Grant Projects

The quality, effectiveness, and impact of the work conducted by the GCC grantees and grants management staff is reflected in the honors and awards they receive. To cite an example, the National Criminal Justice Association (NCJA) awarded two GCC grantees national awards during the past four years for their innovative and successful projects. The NCJA honors grantees as a means to seek out and share information about successful criminal justice programs. The purpose of these awards is to highlight programs that:

- Address an important criminal justice issue.
- Demonstrate effectiveness based on program goals.
- Are good examples of programs that used federal funds to initiate projects and leveraged those funds to obtain state and local resources or become self-sustaining.
- Can easily be replicated in other jurisdictions.

Harriet's House Transitional Housing for Female Ex-Offenders, a female ex-offender transitional program implemented by Passage Home Community Development Corporation, received the Southern Region Award in 2009 for its outstanding work in reducing recidivism and helping women to obtain permanent, safe, and affordable housing in North Carolina. The program was founded on the premise of helping ex-offenders to address problems that lead to re-incarceration, including substance abuse, domestic violence, and limited education. Services provided by Harriet's House include intensive wrap-around case management, employment aid, permanent housing, and family reunification support. Clients of Harriet's House are given an opportunity to learn valuable skills such as budgeting, money management, developing peer support, parenting skills, and skills to remain drug free. Harriet's House operates with support from a network of church congregations that contribute food and clothing and provide tutoring services and childcare.

Project Reentry, an ex-offender transitional services program administered by the Criminal Justice Department of Piedmont Triad Regional Council (PTRC), received the Southern Region Award in 2012 for its work in reducing recidivism and helping ex-offenders successfully reintegrate into society after incarceration. In addition to improving the re-integration of ex-offenders, the program is focused on reducing criminal justice cost and enhancing public safety. These goals are achieved through a coordinated pre- and post-release transitional services system that coordinates services/programs with the North Carolina Department of Public Safety, Project Safe Neighborhood Networks, law enforcement, employers, vocational/educational providers, health/human service agencies, faith-based ministries,

community organizations, and volunteers. Project Reentry features three distinct components: a 13 week pre-release curriculum model, a long-term post release services continuum, and a “PSN Inside Notification” component for targeted inmates.

Model Projects

Many projects funded by the Governor’s Crime Commission have been recognized statewide or nationally as exemplary projects and have significantly enhanced the quality of life for targeted populations. The following programs exemplify the vast impact that funding through the Governor’s Crime Commission has had on thousands of North Carolinians.

- Pitt County CARE NC-2011 Project – this project implemented by East Carolina University, Tender Evaluation, Diagnosis and Intervention for a BEtter Abuse Response (TEDI BEAR) Children’s Advocacy Center provides child-centered collaborative evaluations for alleged victims of child sexual and physical abuse and neglect as well as interagency case coordination, assessment, education, advocacy, and trauma therapy. The extensive collaborations with key stakeholders allows children to receive comprehensive evaluation and treatment services while minimizing the need for children to repeatedly tell their story of abuse or neglect to law enforcement/human service professionals and psychologically relive incidents of maltreatment.
- StepUP Ministry Ex-Offender Occupation Training Project – this project implemented by the StepUP Ministry, provided job training for ex-offenders in occupations that pay at least \$14-15 per hour, such as fiber optics and auto mechanics. Entrepreneurial training was also provided in an effort to assist ex-offenders in starting their own business. This program is particularly noteworthy given that the ex-offenders are an integral part from administering the project to teaching the training courses.
- Kiran, Domestic Violence Services for South Asians Project – this project implemented by Kiran, Inc., used volunteers throughout North Carolina to provide crisis counseling, shelter options, legal resources, safety planning, client services, resource referrals and outreach services to South Asian victims of domestic violence. In addition, project volunteers provided assistance in translating many of the languages/dialects spoken in South Asia.

Criminal Justice Analysis Center Studies 2009-2012

The Criminal Justice Analysis Center (CJAC) conducts original research and program evaluation in an effort to assist the Governor's Crime Commission in attaining its mission of serving as the chief policy advisory body to the governor and the secretary of Public Safety on all matters related to crime and criminal justice. Founded in the mid-1970s, and placed within GCC, this unit has conducted policy-relevant research which has helped shape numerous statewide criminal justice initiatives. Examples include: Reformation of the state DWI laws, evaluation of multi-jurisdictional drug task forces, creation and expansion of the School Resource Officer concept, developing community policing for urban and rural law enforcement, formulating a statewide definition of domestic violence, examining

disproportionate minority confinement in the juvenile justice system, directing granting strategies for after school programs and community based alternatives, and conducting numerous assessments for the purpose of establishing a statewide criminal justice information network. Grant Update

Grant Update provides information to commissioners on what activities a grant program has undertaken to fulfill the grant requirements. The publication provides an overview of the problem, the grant proposal to address that problem, the objectives of the grant and what the program has done to reach their objectives. It includes a summary of how the grant has involved the community and what they have accomplished. Grants featured in the report are recommended by grant managers on the basis of their activities and accomplishments. As of December 2012, CJAC has completed 16 *Grant Updates*.

Training Initiatives

It is the mission of the Crime Prevention/Training Unit of the Governor's Crime Commission to help North Carolinians create safe communities and reduce the opportunity for crime through enhanced partnerships with local law enforcement, business, government and non-profit civic organizations.

In order to accomplish the mission of the Crime Prevention Unit of Governor's Crime Commission, trained staff are available to assist law enforcement agencies, communities, organizations or businesses, at no cost, by providing crime prevention strategies and best practices.

The training unit has continued to offer training throughout the state that reflects the needs of communities. The training unit combined some of the courses with the Department of Justice to reduce

travel costs as well as printing costs of the training manuals. This cost savings benefited both training staff and attendees.

Between the years of 2009 and 2012, the training unit has provided training to over 200 law enforcement agencies, 30 municipalities, 240 houses of worship, 150 schools, colleges, and universities, and thousands of individual citizens. The courses are updated annually and are considered cutting edge in the crime prevention arena. In 2011, a staff member was invited by the National Conference for Catholic Facilities Maintenance to speak on violence prevention for houses of worship. Because of a lack of training available on violence prevention for houses of worship and the interest in this topic noted at the conference, training staff of the Governor's Crime Commission have been asked to conduct training in other states.

In order to continue this trend of being ahead of national training organizations, the training unit will be providing training on sovereign citizen and anti-government subversive groups beginning in 2013. The unit will begin this new series of training by sponsoring a conference in the fall of 2013. This need for training was identified during a survey of law enforcement, prosecutors, and register of deeds. In spring of 2012, a survey was distributed to the Public Safety Departments of all North Carolina colleges and universities as well as all the community colleges' Student Affairs Directors to determine interest in learning more about cyber bullying. The survey responses showed overwhelming support of the Governor's Crime Commission hosting training. Plans are underway to conduct a webinar in June 2013.

North Carolina GangNet

The North Carolina GangNet system provides approved law enforcement and criminal justice agencies throughout the state of North Carolina with instant access to criminal gang intelligence tracking information. The objectives of the North Carolina GangNet system are to expand the recognition and identification of criminal gangs and their members and activities; to increase officer safety by improving the sharing of information among multiple jurisdictions using computer technology; and to enhance community security through the prosecution and suppression of criminal gangs and their members. There are currently over 200 agencies and over 2,000 users participating in NC GangNet.

When the GangNet statewide system was implemented, there were three different nodes. The Western node located in Charlotte, administered by the Charlotte Mecklenburg Police Department, the Eastern node located in Durham, administered by the Durham County Sheriffs' Office, and a replication node located in the State Bureau of Investigation. The three node system has become costly to operate. Plans are underway to consolidate the Western and Eastern nodes into one system. The system is to be housed within the Department of Public Safety. The replication node will be moved to the western data center. The staff hired to staff the Governor's Gang Task Force will serve as staff for NC GangNet. They will administer the system and provide training across the state for law enforcement officers.

Governor's Gang Task Force

The Governor's Gang Task Force was established in October 2010 through Executive Order No. 69. The purpose of the Task Force is to enhance anti-gang law enforcement efforts and develop gang prevention

policies in North Carolina. There are 26 task force members who have been appointed by the Governor. The members include leaders within state agencies, the law enforcement community, legislators, and other key figures involved in gang prevention, intervention, and suppression programs within the state. As set forth in this proclamation, the Task Force has been tasked with the development of a comprehensive plan to ensure a well-coordinated, statewide enforcement program. The task force convened on November 10, 2011 at the Governor's Crime Commission office for its inaugural meeting. Since this meeting the Task Force has worked within specific sub-committees to focus on investigating existing and emerging gang issues within North Carolina as well as working to develop recommendations to address the four integral components of a comprehensive gang reduction strategy: prevention, intervention, suppression and reentry. The Task Force has tapped into national and local resources which have informed the members on effective practices and strategies, while also highlighting areas of need and gaps within communities. The Task Force is considering using components of the OJJDP Comprehensive Gang Model as a framework for statewide gang reduction initiatives.

A panel discussion was held at one Task Force meeting addressing current and emerging gang trends. Members of the panel consisted of former gang members who have made positive changes in their lives and were able to provide insight into the course of their lives to identify factors leading to gang involvement as well the factors that assisted them in eventually desisting from gangs. Other members included community gang reduction specialists whose input allowed for a ground up perspective on problem areas that should be the focus of the Task Force's work. The panel discussions helped to highlight several key issues that most communities are battling with in their fight against gangs. These key issues include, but are not limited to, insufficient resources available within communities to address existing and/or emerging gang problems, need for increased educational and employment opportunities for individuals looking to leave the gang lifestyle, improved collaboration among community partners and law enforcement which would pave the way for effective leveraging of existing resources, and proper identification of gaps to streamline funding to areas of need.

As the Task Force works to complete its objectives by June 2013, the Task will continue developing a comprehensive plan to ensure a coordinated statewide enforcement program, investigate and identify emerging gang issues, and recommend legislative and executive actions necessary for implementation of this plan.

Conclusion

The Governor's Crime Commission has contributed to many of the major criminal justice initiatives during its existence. In the coming years, it will continue to work to constantly improve juvenile and criminal justice systems, victims' services, and community safety and security. Working with the Governor, the General Assembly, state and federal agencies, law enforcement agencies, and non-profit agencies across the state, the Commission will continue to build upon the accomplishments of previous years to continually improve criminal justice, victims and juvenile programs across North Carolina.
